Get Out and Vote!

Saturday, May 6th was Election Day. Depending on your city, a variety of local offices and propositions are on the ballot awaited your decision. You can see the election results at by clicking [here](#).

Turnout for local elections is typically much lower than for presidential or congressional elections. In this local election, turnout in Fort Bend County was 6.29%. That means that out of the 406,838 registers voters in Fort Bend County, only 25,586 voted. Voting is one of our great civic responsibilities. I would love to see us do better this year. Local elections matter, ***your voice heard***, especially in a rapidly growing and changing county such as ours. In many ways, local elections have a bigger and more consistent impact on voters' lives than elections at the state or national level. Local elections often set the trends which filter up to state and national politics.

AAPI Month: Diversity Keeps Texas & HD 76 Strong!

May 1st marked the beginning of Asian-American Pacific Islander (AAPI) Heritage Month. There are 1.9 million AAPIs in Texas. We are the fastest growing minority group, our population has nearly doubled since 2000. AAPIs make important contributions to our state and are an essential part of Fort Bend County's diverse social and cultural fabric. The AAPI community is, itself, a mirror of the enormous cultural, linguistic, and faith diversity we should strive for in our state and in our nation. As a proud AAPI, I hope everyone will use this month to celebrate your friends, neighbors, and, perhaps, yourselves.

Legislation Update

On Saturday, I will lay out [House Bill 5395](#) on the House Floor. Conditional upon voter approval, this bill will create Fort Bend County Water Control and Improvement District #11 in the city of Richmond.

The bill is almost 5,000 words long and does not make for engaging reading. Yet, it is absolutely necessary. Water is essential for individuals and communities. The creation of this water district will make a real difference for Richmond families and businesses.

Not every piece of potential legislation is exciting or headline-grabbing. Many bills are technical, dry, and, unless they impact you directly, rather dull. Just because they are technical and dry, however, doesn't mean they're not important. The bills that do the work are not always the ones which get the spotlight!

This session, I've authored three technology-related bills. Two of these bills are designed to strengthen protections for Texans from the misuse of technology by others. The third is intended to ensure Texans are well placed to benefit from advances in artificial intelligence. For this week's Legislative Lens, I want to explore all three bills in greater detail.

[House Bill 3633](#) directs the Committee on International Relations and Economic Development to conduct a study on the advantages of establishing a Texas Workforce Commission program to train individuals in artificial intelligence systems. The impact of Artificial Intelligence will grow exponentially in the coming years. We must ensure our current workforce is ready, that young Texans are well placed for good jobs in artificial intelligence, and that our state will remain a technology-sector leader. A study on the need to train our workforce in the creation, maintenance, and operation of AI systems is the first solid step in ensuring those things happen.

[House Bill 4761](#) reduces the time in which businesses must notify clients or customers of a computer data security breach from 60 days after the initial breach to 30 days. In the wake of a breach, the sooner

customers can change passwords, report fraudulent activity, and alert law enforcement, the better. This bill gives Texans more time to act promptly and decisively to preempt future problems.

[House Bill 4897](#) creates civil penalties for impersonating another person online, a practice sometimes known as “catfishing.” Advances in technology and artificial intelligence have increased the rate of fake online accounts on social media platforms. Because technology and its uses and misuses evolve so rapidly, there is not yet a section of code that defines “online impersonation,” making it difficult to crack down on. This bill codifies the definition, and creates civil liabilities and damages arising from online impersonations.
