



House Chamber Christmas Tree

Celebrate the season and the creativity of Texans from across the state.

Members of the Texas House of Representatives were invited to select a constituent to create a Christmas ornament to showcase unique elements of their house districts. These ornaments now hang proudly on this native Texas tree in celebration of the many facets of our nation's second largest state, home to over 27 million people.

The photo albums displayed here provide the opportunity for a closer look at the handcrafted treasures that have been received this year. Ornament albums are assembled chronologically by district number. To look for your hometown's district, please reference the nearby House district map.

The Texas House of Representatives is proud to display trees that were provided by the Texas Christmas Tree Growers Association in conjunction with the organization's president, Marianna Wilson, including this 23-foot Virginia pine, compliments of Marshall and Sharlote Cathey of Elves Farm in Denison. Additional trees, three 7-foot Blue Ice cypresses, and two 10-foot Fraser firs, compliments of Marianna and Jim Wilson of Mainstay Farm in Cleburne, are located throughout the Capitol.




Palestine's spectacular dogwood blossoms and the local railroads are represented on this ornament. Both are a testament to the region's history, environment and spirit of commerce.


The names of District 32's communities surround the phrase "Texas Strong," showcasing efforts to recover together from the effects of Hurricane Harvey. The image inside of this ornament includes references to the new Harbor Bridge under construction, which will be the longest cable-stayed bridge in the U.S. and the tallest structure in South Texas upon completion. A ship represents the improvement project to improve the Corpus Christi Ship Channel. The Port of Corpus Christi is the 4th largest in the U.S. in total tonnage and recently became the #1 exporter of U.S.-produced crude oil. Salt at the bottom of the ornament symbolizes Representative Hunter's Desalination Summit to explore water options for the future.

Silver and gold dots denote the starry nights and early mornings in District 81. The sun on the horizon may either be either rising or setting, as ranch work days are long. Small seed beads are woven into the rope encircling the ornament.


