December 2022



First day of the 88th Regular Session. The 88th Texas Legislature convenes on

January 10 and adjourns its regular session on May 29. The legislature meets in regular session for 20 weeks every odd-numbered year beginning at noon on the second Tuesday in January and ending 140 days later. The Texas Constitution gives only the governor the authority to call 30-day special legislative sessions, and it gives only the governor the power to determine what issues are dealt with during a special session. A governor can call as many special sessions as he or she deems appropriate.

On opening day each regular session, the House of Representatives chooses one of its members to serve as the Speaker of the House who serves as its presiding office. The Speaker maintains order, recognizes members to speak during debate and rules on procedural matters.

One of the most important tasks a Speaker does each session is appoint committees, designate the committees' chairs and vicechairs and decides which representatives will serve on each committee. Each session there are subject-matter committees and procedural or administrative committees. Most members serve on two or three different committees. The Texas Health and Human Services and the Texas Department of State Health Services have published these buying tips (see graphic) when purchasing items for young children. The last thing any of us want is to give a gift that harms our children and grandchildren, so not only "check your list twice," look to make sure the toys are not a health hazard.

Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Healthcare Apprentice Initiative. The TWC recently informed my office about one of its new programs to help address the state's critical shortage of nurses and other healthcare professionals. TWC has set aside \$15 million in start-up funding "to offer employers an innovative approach to hiring and training future nurses and healthcare staff." There was a shortage of nurses and healthcare workers prior to the pandemic, which just accelerated the shortfall of trained, available staff. Data from the TWC found that by 2032, "Texas will face a deficit of 57,012 registered nurses needed in our labor market." Steps need to be taken today to close this gap by providing education programs and training opportunities for the needed professionals in this critical field. I have filed three additional bills since last month for a total of nine House bills filed so far. HB 977 - Relating to the creation of a Texas Commission on Assessment and Accountability.

HB 1066 - Relating to a psychological assessment of homicidal risk of a public school student following the student's expulsion or placement in a disciplinary alternative education program for certain conduct.

HB 1067 - Relating to the detachment and annexation of school district territory by petition.
