Health & Human Services Commission

After a thorough sunset review process last session, the state's health agencies have begun a massive restructuring to make the system more efficient, effective, and responsive for all Texans. On Sept. 1, about 4,000 employees and more than 120 programs and functions officially "moved" to the Health and Human Services Commission from other health-related state agencies. The move marks the first of two waves of the state's significant health agency transformation designed to help Texans find and receive services more efficiently.

"This is a monumental effort that's happening behind the scenes. Most people won't notice a change, other than hopefully it's easier for them to find what they need," said Executive Commissioner Charles Smith. "It's a work in progress, and we're putting the system together in a way that puts Texans first."
