State Representative Terri Leo-Wilson Files Resolution to Designate Texas Christian Heritage Week

(Austin, TX) - State Representative. Terri Leo-Wilson filed a bill demonstrating her commitment to the values of House District 23, Texas, and America. That bill is House Concurrent Resolution (HCR) 29, a bill to designate the second to last week in April as Texas Christian Heritage Week.

While the United States observes no official religion, any clear-eyed reading of history will find that the foundational American values of fairness. justice, liberty, and responsibility have their roots deep in Christianity. Founding fathers such as Washington, Adams, and Madison relied on their devout faiths for wisdom and comfort throughout their lives, as do millions of Americans today.

These are the reasons several states, including Louisiana, Virginia, West Virginia, and Wisconsin observe Christian Heritage Week, and why Texas issued a gubernatorial proclamation to do so in 1992. However, in the 31 years since, Texas has not once formally observed the week.

As a woman of deep faith herself, Rep. Leo-Wilson knows how vital Christianity is and has been to the citizens and leaders of our nation. That's why she's filing HCR 29 - it's long past time for the great state of Texas to once again recognize and celebrate the contributions of our hereditary faith.



Texas House Files Budget for Fiscal Biennium 2023-2024



(Austin, TX) - On Wednesday the 17th, the Texas House of Representatives introduced House Bill 1, the proposed state budget for the 2023-2024 fiscal biennium. This budget would appropriate \$288.7 billion, with a record \$130.1 billion in general revenue spending.

This marks only the beginning of the long process necessary to pass the session's one constitutionally mandated piece of legislation. General Appropriations Bills more commonly known as the state budget are introduced by the House and Senate at the start of the legislative session based on assessment of the Legislative an Appropriation Requests state agencies submit over the interim, as well as the Comptroller's Biennial Revenue Estimate.

Comptroller Glenn Hagar's Revenue Estimate for 2023-24 includes room for \$188.4 billion in general revenue spending, so even with the largest spending appropriation in Texas history, this budget still stays well within the bounds of fiscal responsibility. Some of the highlights of the \$130.1 billion in general spending proposed by HB 1 include:

 \$15 billion for property tax relief through appraisal reform

• \$4.6 billion to secure the Texas-Mexico border.

 \$38.4 billion to fully fund Texas' public education system

 \$600 million to school safety equipment and measures, in addition to the \$400 million directed toward school safety in 2022

• \$55 million toward new cybersecurity initiative to protect the information of students in our public education system

 \$20 million to the Alternatives to Abortion program

Of course, these items are only the tip of the iceberg that is the state budget. However, these and other spending priorities represent a good first step toward using the taxpayers' dollars in a responsible and helpful manner. Rep. Leo-Wilson will be on high alert for any waste or misappropriation as HB 1 works its way through the House, and she looks forward to putting the People's money back to work for them.
