

House District 1 - Bowie, Franklin, Lamar & Red River counties District & Capitol Interim Report November 2015

Election results. Texas voters went to the polls earlier this month to vote on seven proposed amendments to the state's 139-year old constitution that was originally adopted in 1876. Since then, Texas voters have voted on 670 proposed amendments while adopting 491 amendments and defeating 179 propositions. All seven propositions were approved by large margins across the state and in HD 1. While reviewing election results, it is interesting to compare total population of the four counties in HD 1 with their number of registered voters to actual voter turnout; see below:

House District 1 has a higher percentage of registered voters than the state, but the percentage of HD 1 voters who turned out for the November general election is similar to the statewide percentage of registered voters who voted. Voter turnout in Texas is among the lowest in the country. Texas Park & Wildlife Department. Texas hunters can assist the statewide chronic wasting disease (CWD)



monitoring effort this fall by voluntarily taking their harvested deer (or the head of the harvested deer) within 24 hours to a location where Texas Parks and Wildlife Department wildlife biologists will collect tissue samples for testing. A list of collection sites and times is available online at <u>www.tpwd.texas.gov/cwd</u>. In addition to those established collection locations, biologists will also be conducting localized sampling at various sites throughout the season to meet sampling objectives.
