Interim and Select Committees Hold Final Hearings

<u>Homeland Security & Public Safety</u> - The Homeland Security & Public Safety Committee met in a joint hearing with the Select Committee On Youth Health and Safety on August 8th. The agenda for the hearing includes issues from charges #4 and #5. For the full hearing notice <u>go here</u>.

The committee heard from multiple panels with psychologists, mental health professionals, and professional educators who spoke on the state of mental health and its availability for care in schools and community clinics in Texas. They discussed specific areas where improvement was needed and some of the areas affected by recent legislative changes, such as Senate Bill 11 from the 86th Session.

The Committees heard from the Manager of the Special Populations Division from the Texas Education Agency as well as the Executive Commissioner of Intellectual and Developmental Disability and Behavioral Health Services for the Texas Department of Health Services. They both gave an overview of various state programs and efforts in providing mental health care across the state. There is an increased emphasis in extending these resources into rural areas of the state.

The panel also heard from speakers from UT Southwestern Center for Depression Research and Clinical Care, who discussed current programs like YAM (Youth Aware of Mental Health) and its effectiveness. They and another panelist from Texas Children's Hospital also discussed innovations in Mental Health Program Delivery in Texas.

The final panel of the day testifying before the joint committee spoke about the law enforcement threat assessment monitoring and response. The Chief of Intelligence and Counterterrorism Center from the DPS provided information about the capabilities of the eight fusion centers in Texas and their abilities to monitor and respond to identified threats. The primary fusion facility in Austin is on the campus of the DPS and the other seven are located in major urban areas of the state and operated with local partner agencies. A senior analyst from the TX DPS also provided an overview of the iWatch program, its use, as well as online monitoring efforts of the fusion centers and their level of cooperation with partnering agencies.

Even though asked, none of the major internet or social media corporations, such as Meta (Facebook) Snapchat, Twitter, or others thought it important enough to appear. Associations representing Internet companies such as Technet, NetChoice, and the Entertainment Software Association each had representatives there to speak about their members concerns as well as actions their member companies take to keep their players and others safe while engaging on the Internet. None really stepped up to accept any responsibility for the level of violence or accessibility to younger children on the major

platforms and deflected any notion that their members were not actively working to ensure the safety of those using their software or platforms.

Given that the Chairman of Homeland Security & Public Safety, James White, did not seek re-election and resigned his position from the Texas House of Representatives on August 11th, the Speaker of the Texas House will take over the responsibility for completing the report on these interim charges, which should

be presented before the beginning of the next legislative session.

Chairman Harless and committee members met in Austin on the 4th and 5th of August at the Capitol for a two day hearing, packed with industry and policy experts from across the country. Through out the two day hearing, we provided social media posts on each of the panelists providing testimony, their area of expertise, and focus of their input. Each was selected relative to their experience and area where they intended to testify. The committee tried not to have repetitive testimony to save on time.

Chairman Harless also invited Representative Brian Harrison, who represents Ellis and Henderson counties, to sit in on the committee due to his experience in public healthcare. Representative Harrison previously served as Chief of Staff for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

During the spring and summer this year, we met with numerous stakeholders, experts, and healthcare advocates to identify specific areas for attention. This first hearing and those testifying reflected the input we received from different areas of the healthcare industry, as well as other committee members.

The first hearing focused on the aspects of the interim charges relating to the "access and affordability" components. We collected a number of renowned public policy experts and stakeholder groups for testimony for our first hearing. Our focus was to get a good cross section of the medical and health care industry landscape in Texas and search for solutions to issues affecting so many Texans across the state. Our Committee Clerks searched for and found a number of public policy experts who provided testimony that detailed a number of issues, as well as different perspectives, from across the healthcare landscape. Each was selected relative to their experience and the committee tried not to have repetitive testimony.

While the healthcare system in our state involves a large number of stakeholders, there is no single "bad actor". Many of the problems we face are "intertwined" in a highly competitive and seemingly lucrative industry. As the Chairman outlined in his opening statement that we are searching for solutions to access and availability that plaque so many Texans dealing with rising healthcare costs.

Our second hearing is planned for October 3rd, where we will have a full day that focuses on the remaining charges before the committee, outreach and enrollment to those eligible for Medicaid or CHIP, and examining the various impacts of delayed care on the state's health system.

Operation Lone Star

Governor Abbott launched Operation Lone Star in March 2021 to respond to a rise in illegal immigration. In May, Governor Abbott issued a disaster declaration that now covers 48 counties, mostly counties along

or near the border. The declaration directed the Department of Public Safety to "use available resources to enforce all applicable federal and state laws to prevent the criminal activity along the border, including criminal trespassing, smuggling, and human trafficking, and to assist Texas counties in their efforts to address those criminal activities." The following month, the Governor opened Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) facilities for detaining arrested persons under Operation Lone Star. The challenges of securing our southern border and controlling the flow of illegal drugs and weapons and border crossings are immense.

Operation Lone Star (OLS) began on March 04, 2021. All numbers reported for Operation Lone Star are unverified and unofficial. Numbers reflect combined reporting from Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), Texas Parks & Wildlife Department (TPWD), and Texas Military Department (TMD). Numbers are approximate and subject to change. Data includes instances where DPS assisted other agencies during the event. Criminal arrests, including criminal trespass arrests, include United States Citizens and illegal migrants. Number of felony charges are placed on individuals arrested for criminal activity during the reporting period. Multiple charges may be placed on an individual during any arrest incident. Charges include Texas Penal Codes 20.05, 20.06, 20.07, 20a, 30.05, 31.07, 34.02, 37.09, 38.03, 38.04, 46, and 71.02; Texas Health and Safety Codes 481 and 483; Texas Transportation Code 545.421; United States Code Titles 8 USC, 18 USC § 922, 18 USC § 1546, 18 USC § 1546, 18 USC § 1956, 18 USC § 1960, 21 USC § 801-971, 26 USC § 5861, 26 USC § 7206; and all warrants. Federal/other charges could include subjects arrested with federal warrants, e.g., DPS initially detained but turned over to a federal agency, etc. Illegal Entries Deterred represents the number of subjects who crossed into the U.S. and then crossed back into MX after encountering law enforcement, as well as those who were in the process of crossing or who had staged in MX to cross but ceased the attempt upon encountering law enforcement. 

As of September 1, 2022, Harris County ESD 16 has completed the transition with Klein Fire Department to become the direct service provider for fire protection and rescue services in the Klein area.

According to Board President Lance Wilson, "This transition has been accomplished as part of the great working relationship we share, and we will continue to provide the best service for the community".

Klein Fire Department saw fire-related incidents in July increase 48% over our busiest month this year. This includes many brush fire type incidents due to heat and drought. We have relied on our working relationships with outside agencies, including HCFMO and Texas A&M Forest Service with the increasing scale and severity of some of the more recent responses. July also saw eight structure fires within our territory and eleven where we provided mutual aid, sometimes with multiple structures threatened or involved.

Harris County has lifted the burn ban enacted in June. This has been a result due to the lower rated KBDI average since we began seeing increased rainfall in August. The Klein Fire Department is rated ISO Class 2 and provides Fire Suppression, Rescue, and Medical Emergency Assistance to a resident population of 173,549 residents covering the Spring/Klein area and encompassing approximately 49 square miles.







Monkeypox in Harris County



<u>Monkeypox</u>, or MPV has been added to Covid as a current concern for risk for infection in Harris County. Judge Hidalgo's Office released this information at the end of July:

"While 71 cases have been reported in Harris County, including the City of Houston, as of July 27 and the risk of infection is currently low in Harris County, we are creating a strategic response plan to get ahead of MPV. As Judge Hidalgo stated in a recent press conference with Mayor Turner and local public health officials, we're sending this update today to try to chart a different path – *not* to raise alarm, but to proactively minimize MPV transmission through preparedness and awareness.

Mayor Turner and Judge Hidalgo have asked the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) to procure and allocate more MPV vaccines and resources to our region. The goal is to vaccinate at-risk communities before transmission grows exponentially, rather than catch up after that happens, as other jurisdictions have had to do. However, that is difficult with the current very limited supply of vaccines to our region. We are working closely with the City of Houston and local health officials to monitor the situation and implement a coordinated response to mitigate further spread."

We have asked the community to take the following steps:

- Limit intimate and sexual contact with anonymous partners
- If you have new/unknown lesions, assume it is Monkeypox and get tested
- Get the vaccine, if you qualify


What you can do:

- Spread the word about community resources, including the 1-pager from with Harris County Public Health information on vaccination information.
- Share the MPV hotline numbers for residents who qualify for the limited supply of vaccines let constituents know that providers throughout the County have the ability to test.
 - Residents who do not have health insurance or cannot cover the cost of the test may contact Harris County Public Health or Houston Health Department to get tested.
 - Harris County residents outside of Houston can call Harris County Public Health at 832-927-0707 or visit ReadyHarris.org.
 - City of Houston residents can call the Houston Health Department at 832-393-4220.
 - Current vaccine eligibility can be reviewed at <u>ReadyHarris.org</u>. We plan to expand eligibility as more vaccines are available and Harris County Commissioners Court will be discussing this at the next meeting.

For August, Harris County's threat level remained in YELLOW alert status - Unvaccinated individuals should continue to mask and physically distance. Level 3 signifies a moderate, but controlled level of COVID-19 in Harris County, meaning a further demonstrated reduction in transmission and the local healthcare system is well within capacity.


