Local, Special District, & Runoff Elections

Texas Run-Off elections are set for May 28th, with Early Voting to run from May 20th through May 24th. May 17th is the deadline for requesting a mail ballot if you want to vote by mail.

The local jurisdiction and special district election for May 4th early voting has been underway for a week. Turnout has been low with only 19,500 people voting in-person and 14,152 mail ballots received for a total of 33,652 people voting early. Election Day is May 4th.

Fm 1960 & Hwy 249 Underpass Cleanup



My office has heard from a number of constituents about the deplorable conditions under the overpass at FM 1960 and HWY 249 (Tomball Parkway). We have been communicating with the City of Houston, The Pct 3 County Commissioner's Office and the Texas Department of Transportation, regarding the primary responsibility for keeping the area clean. Ultimately, this responsibility falls to TxDOT and after a number of calls, they responded and directed a clean-up crew to the underpass and the picture above depicts their level of effort on just one occasion.

We sincerely appreciate their work and we are working to establish some kind of routine for them to check conditions and/or clean debris to avoid this kind of buildup in the future.

I would also like to thank the constituents who took the time to contact my office and report this issue. This type of community involvement and outreach is very important and appreciated.

Homeless Efforts & Resources Hope Center Houston

Our constituents call occasionally about homeless issues in our area and our contact with local agencies to assist with them continues. Recently we visited with one such resource, The Hope Center Houston and learned about their efforts to provide unique services.

Hope Center Houston has been working in northern Harris County to help get the homeless off the streets and into a better life for about eight years now. Over that time they have seen the homeless population increase in the Spring/Klein/Cypress area, particularly since the pandemic put a lot of people out of work.

Last year they were seeing about 40 new homeless people each month in addition to their regulars. This year the number of new homeless is trending upwards with them even seeing eight new "guests" in one day in April. Surprisingly, some of the new guests are holding down jobs while living in their cars. Sadly, they also see many senior citizens who are not able to afford an apartment on their monthly social security check.

Since locating housing for this special population is an issue, they are actively working with other non-profit agencies to develop a game plan to handle the continued increase in people facing the crises that homelessness brings.

Their "new" facility, a 14,000 square foot building next to HCA Houston Hospital Northwest, that was acquired in the summer of 2019, gives them the ability to offer "one-stop shopping" for all that the homeless need to get back on their feet. If they can't provide it, they will find another agency that can.

The first step for new guests is to go through an initial assessment where immediate needs are identified. Then they are shown the process to obtain essential daily needs. Here are the numbers of some of the most sought after services for 2023. 18,000 meals provided; 1,200 sets of clothing given; 580 bundles of clothes cleaned; 1,727 showers taken; mail service provided for 1,526; and 10,750 times that someone entered the building for any service. Finally, the guest meets with the Center's Social Services Coordinator who helps the guest put together a long range plan aimed at preparing them for reentry into society with the ultimate goal of being employed (if they are able) and housed. Fifty Hope Center Houston guests were placed into an apartment in 2023 and twenty-one thus far in 2024.

As a partner agency of the Coalition for the Homeless in Houston they are able to put their guests on the path to getting into an apartment, an essential step in the "Housing First" strategy that has helped make Houston a model for the nation. Once in an apartment, a case manager works closely with the person to find the services they need to become a productive citizen once more and make their homeless experiences brief, rare, and non-recurring.

Recognizing the need to expand their services to deal with the increased influx of those needing help, they have brought on some new board members which includes one of their former guests who is now a successful plumber in the area.

In addition they are at the beginning stages of participating in a project that will bring much needed transitional and permanent housing to this population.

Hope Center Houston is always in need of caring individuals to volunteer one or two mornings per week assisting in providing one of the services listed — above and for some other tasks as well. "Squatting" in Texas

Governor Abbott recently made comments regarding "Squatters in Texas" that have prompted questions from residents in our District. So, we thought we'd cover just a little about what is happening with this new phenomenon.

The term "Squatting" refers to a process known as "adverse possession" whereby someone attempts to gain possession of a property or residence in the absence of its rightful owner. The target for this kind of property can be homes for sale, rental or leased property, or vacant property. Various news reports over the last several month have highlighted growing interest in addressing this trend happening across the United States. These news articles have also highlighted the numerous scams or schemes to create "possession" through fraudulent lease, rental, or purchase agreements.

Some may question the difference between trespassing and "squatting". Squatting is an attempt to set up ownership through mere possession and trespassing is the act of being on the property illegally because you had notice, or knew you were not allowed on the premises.

Texas Penal Code Sec 30.05

Sec. 30.05. CRIMINAL TRESPASS. (a) A person commits an offense if the person enters or remains on or in property of another, including residential land, agricultural land, a recreational vehicle park, a building, a general residential operation operating as a residential treatment center, or an aircraft or other vehicle, without effective consent and the person:

- (1) had notice that the entry was forbidden; or
- (2) received notice to depart but failed to do so.

Adverse Possession is defined in the Texas Civil Practice and Remedies Code.

Texas Civil Practice & Remedies Code Section 16.021

Sec. 16.021. DEFINITIONS. In this subchapter:

(1) "Adverse possession" means an actual and visible appropriation of real property, commenced and

continued under a claim of right that is inconsistent with and is hostile to the claim of another person.

- (2) "Color of title" means a consecutive chain of transfers to the person in possession that:
- (A) is not regular because of a muniment that is not properly recorded or is only in writing or because of a similar defect that does not want of intrinsic fairness or honesty; or
- (B) is based on a certificate of headright, land warrant, or land scrip.
- (3) "Peaceable possession" means possession of real property that is continuous and is not interrupted by an adverse suit to recover the property.
- (4) "Title" means a regular chain of transfers of real property from or under the sovereignty of the soil.

In most cases, in order to establish a successful claim, a "squatter" must maintain continuous physical possession for three to ten years (with or without color of title), but the issue currently gets mired down in a complex legal process that can impact the owner's ability to effect possession, sale, or rental of the property. In some cases it can be a difficult and lengthy process to resolve and may have to be resolved through the courts.

The property Management Company Innago lists specifics about the statutory requirements and some recommendations on prevention and response <u>here.</u> As with any criminal or legal issue, we recommend seeking guidance from the appropriate law enforcement agency or an attorney before taking action.

At this time, multiple Legislators have expressed concern and interest in addressing this topic during the next legislative session and we anticipate relevant legislation to be filed.



Water Safety



Now that the heat is here and swimming pool usage will soon be in full swing, CESD would like to remind everyone to be careful in and around bodies of water. DON'T TAKE WATER SAFETY FOR GRANTED!

Drowning is a major public health issue that can be prevented.

- More children ages 1–4 die from drowning than any other cause of death except birth defects.
- · Drowning happens in seconds and is often silent.
- · Drowning can happen to anyone, any time there is access to water.

You can prevent drowning.

Learn basic swimming and water safety skills

Formal swimming lessons can reduce the risk of drowning. Children who have had swimming lessons still need close and constant supervision when in or around water.

Supervise closely

Designate a responsible adult to supervise closely and constantly when children are in or near water (including bathtubs). You can assign a specific adult to supervise each child when they have access to water. Adults watching kids in or near water should avoid distracting activities like reading, using the phone, and consuming alcohol or drugs, because drowning happens quickly and quietly.

Wear a life jacket

Life jackets reduce the risk of drowning while boating for people of all ages and swimming abilities. Life jackets should be used by children for all activities while in and around natural water. Life jackets can also be used by weaker swimmers of all ages in and around natural water and swimming pools. Do not rely on air-filled or foam toys, as these are not safety devices.

Learn CPR

Your CPR skills could save someone's life in the time it takes for paramedics to arrive. Many organizations such as <u>American Red Cross</u> and <u>American Heart Association</u> offer CPR training courses, both online and in-person.

Avoid alcohol

Avoid drinking alcohol before or during swimming, boating, or other water activities. Do not drink alcohol while supervising children. Alcohol impairs judgment, balance, and coordination.


Use the buddy system


Always swim with a buddy. Choose swimming sites that have lifeguards when possible. The buddy system

is especially beneficial for people with seizure disorders or other medical conditions that increase their risk of drowning.

HAIRGROVE ES STUDENTS SET TONE FOR ADOBE JR. AMBASSADORS PROGRAM



April 27, 2024—The initiative and creativity of fifth grade students at Hairgrove Elementary School led to the campus being the first Adobe Express Junior Ambassadors program worldwide.

to the campus. Adobe representatives Claudio Zavala Jr., education evangelist; and Darren Smith, program manager of education; met with teacher Christine Morgan's Junior Ambassador cohort. During the 2022-2023 school year, Hairgrove teacher Christine Morgan expanded the use of the Adobe Express platform with her students. The free multipurpose creative tool allowed the Dolphins to make engaging projects with customized designs that enhanced their learning experience. Morgan, a social media-savvy educator, posted some of the creations online and caught the attention of

Adobe Education executives. One of them, Ben Forta, Adobe senior director of education initiatives, was impressed by the content he saw on Twitter (X) and reached out.

"There was something about the energy in those words, and how excited the kids were," Forta recalls. "Something clicked in my head, and I messaged her asking if she would be interested in partnering with me to see if we can do this with all kids. There really wasn't much of a program before this." Morgan and Hairgrove Principal Michelle Lee agreed to launch an Adobe Express Junior Ambassador cohort with 20 fifth grade students, who began meeting every Wednesday after school for one hour to collaborate and create.

"We worked on projects that students were inspired by or wanted to create themselves, such as custom backgrounds for the Chrome browser and even the Apple Watch," Morgan said. "It was exciting to bond with them over creativity, but also empowering and inspiring for everyone involved. It became the best part of my school year."

One of the favorite activities, "kindness dashing," involved students creating inspirational and uplifting cards that they printed out and distributed around the school—in the library, in bathrooms and on desks—that could make someone smile on a rough day.


