Harris County Criminal Courts Data Now Available

During the 88th Legislative Session I filed and passed <u>HB 1182</u> to increase court transparency, particularly in our criminal courts. There are 29 Criminal District Courts in Harris County and each of their judges comes up for election every four years. Following COVID, a number of counties had questions about the performance of their criminal courts judges. As an elected office it had previously been extremely difficult to identify the activity of individual courts in populous counties, due to the use of consolidated reporting. Texas' Office of Court Administration, under the requirements of this new statute has begun mandating court-level reporting from all counties over 1 million in population. Additionally, each of those counties is also required to make this information available on their public internet websites.

Currently, when determining whether an incumbent judge is one you want to continue to vote for or not, this information is now available for each court. The data is listed by month for each of the courts and broken down into several categories that can help identify court activity, case volume, the number of trials by that judge, whether visiting or associate judges are used, as well as the number of pleas taken and cases assigned and more.

As an important part of the criminal justice system, these courts play a large role in the overall process. Their productivity directly impacts issues like backlogs in the courts and overcrowding in the jails and I filed this legislation specifically to increase transparency for productivity in these courts. These reports demonstrate that the legislation is working.

The Drainage Improvement District is continuing to solicit community input for flood mitigation and resilience. Please complete our **online survey** ;we will continue to collect survey data through July.





With Thanksgiving quickly approaching, here are the Top Safety Tips:

- Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking on the stove top so you can keep an eye on the food.
- Stay in the home when cooking your turkey, and check on it frequently.
- Keep children away from the stove. The stove will be hot and kids should stay three feet away.
- Make sure kids stay away from hot food and liquids. The steam or splash from vegetables, gravy or coffee could cause serious burns.
- Keep knives out of the reach of children.
- Be sure electric cords from an electric knife, coffee maker, plate warmer or mixer are not dangling off the counter within easy reach of a child.
- Keep matches and utility lighters out of the reach of children up high in a locked cabinet.
- Never leave children alone in room with a lit candle.
- Keep the floor clear so you don't trip over kids, toys, pocketbooks or bags.
- Make sure your smoke alarms are working. Test them by pushing the test button.



Battery Safety

Take C.H.A.R.G.E. of Battery Safety

The alarming rise in fires at area recycling and disposal facilities, frequently linked to discarded lithium-ion batteries, highlights the urgent need to address battery safety. This trend, coupled with the growing use of lithium-ion devices, poses an increasing risk of battery fires in our homes and workplaces.

The Harris County Fire Marshal's Office (HCFMO) is raising awareness with its "Take C.H.A.R.G.E. of

Battery Safety" campaign. From the first sign of a problem, you could have less than a minute to escape a battery fire. The best way to be safe is to prevent a fire from starting. There are six essential steps you can take to reduce your risk and keep yourself, family, and neighbors safer from harm.

- 1. Choose certified products.
- 2. Handle lithium-ion battery-powered devices with care.
- 3. Always stay alert for warning signs.
- 4. Recycle devices and batteries properly.
- 5. Get out quickly if there's a fire.
- 6. Educate others on battery safety.







"Smoke Alarms: Make them work for you!™"

Carbon Monoxide (CO) The Silent Killer

CO is a toxic, colorless, odorless, tasteless gas. Watch out for these CO warnings!

- Service your furnace by a qualified professional to check for leaks.
- Never leave a car running in a garage, even with open doors.
- Never run a generator in the home or garage. Opening doors and windows or using fans will NOT prevent CO build-up in the house.
- When running a generator outdoors, keep it away from open windows.
- Never burn charcoal in homes or garages.
- Never install or service combustion appliances without proper knowledge and skills.
- Never use a gas range, oven, or dryer for heating the home.
- Never put foil on the bottom of a gas oven because it interferes with combustion.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it.
- If it still sounds, call 9-1-1. Immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for.
- Stay outside until the fire department arrives.

Symptoms of CO poisoning

The initial symptoms of CO poisoning are similar to the flu (but without the fever); they include:

- · Headache
- Fatigue
- Shortness of breath
- Nausea
- · Dizziness

• If you suspect that you are experiencing CO poisoning, get fresh air immediately. Leave the house and call 9-1-1 from a neighbor's home or cell phone. You could lose consciousness and die from CO poisoning if you stay in the home.

Get a CO Detector

Animation classes allow students to achieve dreams(By Sama Abudhhir, Cypress Park High School)

Oct. 29, 2024—Eric Willard's animation course at Cypress Park High School has students flocking to his room adorned with murals of popular films from Disney, Pixar and Star Wars franchises. It's not just the aesthetics that draw students in; it's the popularity of animation.

In 2020, animation films accounted for more than \$10 billion in global box office revenue, according to industry trend site *Linearity*. The global animation market was valued at \$371.21 billion in 2023, according to the Academy of Animated Art. Anime and manga-style comics and films continue to attract high-school-aged students.

CFISD offers animation courses in all 12 high school campuses, including opportunities for certifications like Adobe Animate (Animation I), Autodesk Maya (Animation II) and Adobe After Effects (Practicum in Animation).

Students learn the classic 2D animation in Animation I class and can learn 3D computer animation if they progress to Animation II. Animation is defined as the technique of photographing successive drawings or positions of puppets or models to create an illusion of movement when the movie is shown as a sequence. The class allows regular students to create art in a format that captured their hearts as children.

"I always attribute my affinity for animation to my love for the movies," Willard said. "Like many, I have

always loved going to the movies since the first one that I really remember, which was 'Alien' when I was 5 with my mom and brother. The imagination of that movie, and hundreds, if not thousands, that I've seen since, all are so creative. Animation is a very cheap way to express your creativity, without having to have millions to do it. Luckily, I've found a great teaching landing spot, in the form of animation." Willard's introduction to animation is much like that he gives students in his Animation I class. Beginning with a classic flipbook, a stack of paper with drawings on each sheet that when flipped through gives the illusion of movement.

The Infrastructure Division also oversees the Child Safety Fund which is used to provide warranted school zone flashing warning signals in compliance with Precinct 4's criteria, the installation of a warranted traffic signal system facilitating the movement of traffic around a school facility to promote student safety.
