PROPERTY TAX RELIEF

The new property tax relief plan represents a significant win for providing relief to Texas property owners and reflects the commitment of Texas leaders to address the concerns of taxpayers.

The tax cut legislation totals \$18 billion and includes:


- Over \$12 billion will be spent on reducing the school property tax rate for all homeowners and business properties.
- Every homeowner who homesteads their home (approximately 5.7 million homeowners) will get a \$100,000 homestead exemption.
- Non-homesteaded properties, valued at \$5 million and under, including residential and commercial properties, will receive a 20% circuit breaker on appraised values as a 3-year pilot project.

Effective for tax year 2024, subject to the applicable Constitutional Amendments passing.

BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

- Appropriated \$144.3 billion to fund the state over the next two years (Balanced; within constitutional limits).
- \$5.1 billion in border security (largest investment in state history).
- \$50.4 billion for public education (\$8.9 billion increase) (state's share over ½).
- \$1.4 billion for school safety grants.
- Dedicating \$17.6 billion for property tax relief (including \$5.3 billion to tax rate compression and \$12.3 billion for various tax relief options).
- \$9.3 billion for infrastructure-related projects, including roads, water and broadband.
- \$9.4 billion for mental health, including
 \$1.6 billion for mental health bed capacity.
- \$40 million increase to the Alternatives to Abortion program.



BORDER SECURITY AND FENTANYL CRISIS

Spiller Interstate Compact Bill


It is especially rewarding to have passed my Border Interstate Compact Bill, House Bill 82 (Senate Bill 1403). This bill creates an interstate compact that allows states to collaborate and share resources for the purpose of border enforcement. It is important to note, this bill does not require the consent of Congress. Simply put, this legislation allows participating states and their law enforcement agencies to share resources, intelligence, and funding for border enforcement efforts. This would strengthen our capabilities to address, manage, and overcome the continuing security crisis at our border.

- SB 423 Provides Texas military forces the authority to use unmanned aircraft as part of an operation, exercise, or mission. The bill legalizes the use of drones for search and recovery missions after natural disasters and for monitoring the Texas-Mexico border as part of Operation Lone Star.
- SB 602 Expands the authority of U.S. Border Patrol agents who have completed a DPS training program to include arrest, search, and seizure at established border checkpoints and points of entry for felony offenses under Texas law.
- SB 1133 Creates a grant program to compensate agricultural landowners up to \$75,000 for property damage caused by trespassers committing a border crime.
- SB 1403 Authorizes the Governor to coordinate and execute
 an interstate compact for border security among interested
 states without congressional approval. The compact will allow
 participating states to share law enforcement intelligence and
 resources and protect personnel and property.
- SB 1484 Creates a collaborative border operations training program through DPS for peace officers employed by local law enforcement agencies along the border. It allows DPS to share expertise in identifying and preventing transnational criminal activity with local authorities.
- SB 1900 Designates Mexican drug cartels and criminal
 organizations as foreign terrorist organizations in the State of
 Texas and increases penalties for the destruction of illegal drugs
 and the operation of stash houses. This bill also adds foreign
 terrorist organizations to current intelligence databases and
 allows local entities to seek public nuisance claims against them.

- SB 22 Establishes Rural Law Enforcement Grant Program for Sheriff, Constable, and Prosecutor's Offices in qualifying districts/ counties.
- **HB 90** The Bishop Evans Act improves worker's compensation and death benefits for Texas National Guard and State Guard on state active duty.

ENSURING OUR ELECTIONS ARE SECURED

- HB 1243 Returns the penalty for voter fraud to a felony.
- HB 5180 Provides for public inspection of ballots after 60 days of an election.
- HB 87 Requires each presidential elector to be nominated by their political party. Additionally requires the filing of a replacement nominee for an original nominee who withdraws, dies, or is declared ineligible.
- SB 1933 Provides procedures for state oversight of a county office administering elections or voter registration in the event the office has a complaint filed against them or where problems repeatedly occur.
- SB 1070 Ensures Texas participates in an efficient and costeffective interstate voter registration cross-check program by
 expanding the factors a publicly developed system can compare
 and provides that a private option the state uses must meet certain
 cost and functionality standards.

RURAL TEXAS WINS & SPILLER BILLS

State Water Infrastructure Security

SB 28 - Creates the Texas Water Fund, allowing applicants to receive assistance in financing new water sources for the state.

Rural Healthcare

HB 3119 - Clarifies and standardizes the election process for general law hospital district's board of directors.

Texas Broadband Infrastructure

HB 9/HJR 125 - Establishes the TX Broadband Infrastructure Fund, expanding the state's framework for improving broadband connectivity across the state.

SB 1710 - Ensures support for connectivity throughout rural Texas is continued through the Texas Universal Service Fund (TUSF).

ERCOT and Grid Sustainability

SB 1015 - Change to the existing Distribution Costs Recover Factor (DCRF) to allow utilities to file a DCRF proceeding twice a year instead of once a year.

HB 1500 - Makes necessary changes to the functions and operations of the Public Utility Commission (PUC) and strengthens the ERCOT power grid by requiring the development of reliable energy programs like the performance credit mechanism or dispatchable reliability reserve services.

SB 2627 - Enables the Public Utility Commission to approve lowinterest loans to provide dispatchable electric generation facilities to the ERCOT power region. Dispatchable power generation includes facilities using coal, nuclear, and natural gas as fuels. SB 2011 - Provides consumer protection to Texans by increasing the administrative penalties for power generators that are not compliant with their plan filed with the Public Utility Commission.

SB 2013 - Fortifies the Texas power grid by establishing new policies and procedures for businesses and their employees operating in the ERCOT power region. Businesses associated with China, Iran, North Korea, and Russia may not access the grid. It also mandates background checks for employees working with Texas' critical infrastructure.

Agriculture and Farming

HJR 126 - Proposing a constitutional amendment protecting the right to engage in farming, ranching, timber production, horticulture, and wildlife management.

HB 1750 - Prohibits cities from imposing "governmental requirements" on all agricultural operations within city limits, no matter when the land was annexed by the city.

HB 2308 - Strengthens the current protections in law to prevent nuisance lawsuits against agricultural operations.

HB 2271 - Revises the Texas Agricultural Code to include "aquaculture" as an agricultural operation.

SB 664 - States that producers of imitation meat products will be in violation of the new requirements if the food's labels, brands, images, depictions, or graphics misrepresent the food in the package.

HB 73 - Prevents landowners from being held liable for damages caused by livestock due to a damaged fence.

SB 505 - Imposes an annual registration fee for electric vehicles that will be deposited to the credit of the state highway fund to maintain roads.

PUBLIC EDUCATION AND RETIRED TEACHERS

- HB 3 Defines the roles and responsibilities of the TX School Safety Center and the TX Education Agency, ensuring school safety standards can be properly enforced.
 - At least one armed security officer is to be present on every school campus to ensure campuses are monitored and protected.
- **HB** 1416 Revises accelerated learning requirements established in the 87th session by increasing parental opt-out & providing educator flexibility and school district control.
- HB 1133 Provides additional options as to how schools and places of religious worship can better protect their students and congregations by allowing any peace office to provide voluntary security services.
- SB 10 Delivers a COLA (first time since 2013) for retired teachers (pending the Constitutional Amendment passing by the voters) while ensuring the TRS pension fund remains actuarially sound for the next generation to retire. Additionally, eligible annuitants at least 70 years of age will receive a lump sum of \$5k.

- HJR 2 Proposing a constitutional amendment authorizing the 88th Legislature to provide a cost-of-living adjustment to certain annuitants of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas. Community College Funding.
- HB 8 Establishes a new funding model for community colleges in Texas focused on recognizing and rewarding them for the
 important role they play of value required in more than 60% of jobs in the state over the next decade.
