



Dear Friends and Neighbors,

In times of crisis, our community's strength and resilience shine through our collective efforts to safeguard all, especially our most vulnerable members. The recent widespread power outages across our region have tested our emergency response systems and highlighted the profound impact such events can have on us. Many households faced significant challenges, from spoiled groceries to the absence of air conditioning in the sweltering heat. Among those most affected are our senior citizens, who often rely on consistent power for medical reasons and basic comfort.

As a physician specializing in geriatric care, I am acutely aware of the needs of our elderly population. The recent power outages severely disrupted our capacity to provide essential care. This crisis has touched my family closely, as my parents, both in their 80s, live with me. I was fortunate to be close to them and ensure their safety and comfort while we had no power

Despite Texas' substantial resources, including a [significant Rainy Day Fund projected to reach \\$23.77 billion by the end of FY 2025](#), comprehensive strategies to manage long-term power disruptions remain underdeveloped. [Texas finds itself ranked 37th in the allocation of state and local government funding per resident](#), highlighting the broader issue of underinvestment in essential infrastructure. While the legislature has previously tapped into this fund, little has been done to enhance the essential services needed to mitigate such disasters for everyday Texans. We possess the technological and financial means to significantly improve these systems, yet we have not fully leveraged these resources to ensure our infrastructure can withstand future crises. Furthermore, it is evident that service providers like CenterPoint must improve their preparedness and response strategies to better serve their customers during such critical times. We are committed to investigating these failures and ensuring accountability.

As we reflect and consider the areas in need of improvement, one issue has resurfaced. The distinct role and vulnerabilities of senior living facilities of all types. [Recent reports](#) have highlighted that many of them were without power or had [inadequate backup generation during the outages](#). This underscores the need for comprehensive emergency preparedness across all such facilities. I will pursue legislation to ensure these facilities meet stringent safety and operational standards during emergencies. My proposals include requiring all types of senior living facilities to file emergency response plans with the state, establishing a statewide database

for tracking and responding, mandating robust emergency power solutions, and advocating for the strategic use of Rainy Day Funds to support these critical infrastructure improvements.

I am also studying emerging technologies developed through federal grants, [which aim to reduce costs and enhance the reliability of essential services like underground utilities](#). These innovative solutions are crucial for modernizing our infrastructure and ensuring its resilience against future challenges, including those posed by climate change.

This issue transcends mere policy—it directly impacts the dignity and safety of every Texan. The impact of climate change is undeniable, and we must take proactive measures to prepare for increasingly severe weather conditions. Together, we can build a resilient infrastructure that meets today's challenges and adapts to those we may face tomorrow. Let us rise to this occasion with the commitment and foresight needed to protect and empower our community, ensuring a safer and more secure future for all.

Red Cross Disaster Assistance

Texas Workforce Commission

Disaster Unemployment Assistance provides unemployment benefits for individuals who lost their jobs or self-employment or who are no longer working as a direct result of a major disaster for which a disaster assistance period is declared, and who applied but are not eligible for regular unemployment benefits.

DUA is available only during the Disaster Assistance Period, which begins with the first Sunday following the date that the major disaster is declared. Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and DUA regulations determine when the Disaster Assistance Period begins and ends. Claimants must file their initial applications for DUA within 60 days of the presidential declaration of the disaster.

Food

Houston Food Bank said it is closely monitoring conditions and will provide relief through its 1,600 community partners across SE Texas.
